
BEREAVEMENT

Bereavement is the wrenching story that examines the horrific case of Martin Bristol, kidnapped from a backyard swing and forced to witness the brutal crimes of a deranged madman. 
MICHAEL BIEHN

Michael has starred in numerous genre smashes over the years, including The Terminator, The Abyss, Aliens, Tombstone, and many others.




NOLAN GERARD FUNK

EARLY BEREAVEMENT REVIEW:

"One of the beauties of horror is that sometimes it takes you to dark places and tells you, you don't ever want to go here. BEREAVEMENT does exactly that. While MALEVOLENCE played the slasher card, and did a nice job at it, this prequel delves far deeper into grimness and despair, plunging its audience into those horrifying depths without ever letting them up for air.Before I go further, I'll say this. The best horror films have a way of making us feel unsafe in our own world, and BEREAVEMENT does exactly that.

After the death of her parents, teen Allison has come to live with her uncle John his family. As John tries to establish the patriarchal authority over his new charge, Allison rebels. Staying out late and hanging out with local teen William (whose own family is a shattered mess, his father wheelchair bound, his mother a suicide), she seems all too willing to escape her new family, as much as they try to accommodate her. A high school track star in Chicago, she constantly running, a nice motif for her desire to run from the many troubles of her life. When she catches sight of Martin in a window, she can only run into despair. Alexandra Daddario performance holds the film together, and Mena gets a nice performance out of her, as well as Michael Biehn as John. As Mena develops his technique, he's starting to fulfill the promise that MALEVOLENCE suggested. He's coming into his own as a director. For a young talent, his shot selection is superb, and he knows how to build tension to a crescendo of madness. The terror is relentless, and he makes the most of his setting, the grim, real-life slaughter house he also used in MALEVOLENCE, including his creative use of a carcass hook, a furnace and a freezer unit. As a writer, he proves he's also capable of creating a much more textured world than about 99.9 percent of the new horror film directors; he balances this against a constant sense of dread. We know from seeing the first film that none of these characters are going to live, yet Mena finds ways to stun and shock. For this, I applaud him.

Horror been in a rut for a while, over saturated by derivative remakes and backyard zombie flicks. Stevan Mena challenges the system with his output, and offers fresh hope for the genre. If he's any indicator of a new wave of horror, we have a lot to look forward to. He's a talent on the rise, and if you consider yourself worth your salt, you must see BEREAVEMENT. It's a dark place, and I'm telling you, you should go there."

Stevan Mena Writer / Producer/ Director

- Stevan has been compared to directing icons John Carpenter and Sam Raimi, and is being hailed as one of the top up and coming horror directors to watch. Stevan began making films in his backyard at age 11. While other kids were playing sports, he was making movies. He also spent many years honing his craft as a screenwriter.
- Stevan's much heralded debut feature, Malevolence, was truly a remarkable achievement. Shot on a shoestring budget, with the actor's and crew all taking deferred payments, including himself, Stevan wrote, produced, directed, edited and even composed the score for Malevolence. When the film was completed, distributors estimated its production cost at 1.5 to 2 million. Discovering the budget was under \$200,000 shocked many in the industry. Malevolence went on to win several Film Festivals, including best feature at the Long Island International Film Expo, and Best Feature at the NYC Horror Film Festival. It was awarded best screenplay at the 2004 internet choice awards, and was listed on numerous "best horror film of the year" lists. The highest selling DVD rollout in Anchor Bay Entertainment's history of 3500 titles.
- His latest feature, Bereavement, is a bold departure from the standard cliche ridden horror film, offering genuine scares and shocks. With stellar Performances from Genre Veterans like MIchael Biehn and John Savage, to rising stars such as Alexandra Daddario (Percy Jackson, Hall Pass) and Peyton List (Dlary of a Wimpy Kid 2) and Brett Rickaby (The Crazies).
